What Can I Do?

Pat Spooner Fund



DECEMBER MISSION –

OPEN ARMS UCC GOES AROUND THE WORLD TO INDIA







Chhattisgarhi is the most widely spoken language, followed by Hindi; both are official languages of the state. *Since Open Arms has no one who speaks either of those languages, our mission this December will refer simply to this agency as DEEP.*

Chhattisgarh is a state of east-central <u>India</u>. It is a rural area that struggles with literacy, Ignorance, superstition which are major hindrances in any significant development process.

Children and women face the consequences of apathy of social, economic, cultural, and political processes.

DEEP is the lamp to bring hope to the marginalized section of the society. So that communities can realize their rights and aspire for a new society. DEEP is nothing but a calling for the civil society to participate in the process. "The DEEP LAMP was lighted to bring HOPE IN DESPAIR."

<u>CHILDREN:</u> Since1982 Deep has been a Social Service Organization, serving women and children in rural areas. Children do not get adequate food, child care, education, health care etc., as their parents work from daybreak to Thanks to our own Rev. Krueger for the suggestion to fund mission money to DEEP. He has known staff from there and is familiar with their good work.

sundown to meet the basic needs of the family. As a result of which, children incur diseases, worm infections and regular episode of diarrhea which make them mal- nourished and limit their mental and physical growth. Many of the pregnant mothers are anemic and iron deficient; improper prenatal and post-natal care has resulted in child mortality, low birth weight and threat to the mother's life during delivery. A safe mother program teaches nutrition, health practices & hygiene behavior, prevention of common disease, first aid skills, home nursing etc.

Day Care centers run for three hours every day in villages where children learn and practice hygiene, behavior, and creative expression. The teachers teach moral values through storytelling, games, songs, craft, skits and exposure. They keep a health record of every child, and provide special lessons for baby sitters.

WOMEN: Programs aim to make women realize their potential and develop a transformation process for individuals and communities to form a just society from an oppressive system. The results of the old caste system are still in place. Gender sensitization classes enable women to think critically to counter these marginalizing forces.

ADOLESCENT GIRLS: The organization arranges short term courses for the adolescent girls to enhance their capacity to face the future challenges The program provides awareness on the importance of balanced diet, health & hygiene, sex education, child care, home management, skill development for economic independence (through tailoring, food preservation etc.) to make them confident and self-reliant. Their mothers are taught not to discriminate their daughters from their sons and that every child should be treated equally. The teachers counsel the families to motivate them to educate their daughters.

After a study of the extensive programs of DEEP, one is even more impressed with the

vision for a five-year future program:



~ Providing regular nursing training teacher's training and job-oriented training to 50 girls from lower socio-economic background in a year. ~ Reach 500 students through 10 day care centers.~ Ensure good health of 100 pregnant mothers every year.~ Train 200 adolescent girls on life skills every year.~ Support 50 girl students every year to continue studies.

Wondering why a mission around the globe for Advent and

Christmas? Jesus was a baby and then a child. DEEP has comprehensive

programs that minister to babies and children in need. Seems like a fit!!! And India is much closer to that stable in Bethlehem!!

The mission folks at Open Arms have set a goal for December giving to DEEP:

- Health checkups for 40 mothers (\$200)

- Life skills training programs for 25 girls (\$500) = <u>\$700 Total for Advent through</u> <u>Christmas Eve and December</u>
