A popular comedienne always asked of us as she concluded her TV show: "Be **kind** to one another." -so much more heartfelt than "be nice to one another."

Is it easier to be nice than to be kind? Think about that.

In Jesus' life, he illustrated many examples of kindness, lessons that teach us how to practice that quality. At an elegant meal, he defended a low woman who washed his feet with her hair, even though the guests scorned her. He consorted with a foreigner, a Samaritan woman at the well, when such an association was frowned upon. Without fear, he touched the outcast leper. Seeing Zacchaeus, the despised tax collector, Jesus kindly invited himself to dine at his house. And of all things, when one of his disciples cut off the ear of an official servant about to arrest Jesus at that fateful time, Jesus touched the man, his enemy, and healed him.

It's easy to smile and be nice, to embrace the old societal norms and not rock the boat. No, it's **not** easy to be kind to the exiled, foreigners, unclean, those who hate you. But that's our Open Arms' mission.

Through his kindness, Jesus healed his enemy, the bleeding, injured servant. If Christians had the courage to practice such kindness, perhaps we could help mend our bleeding and injured world.

Wouldn't that be "nice"?

Mission Team Report from Gail and Pam

CHRONOLOGICAL REVIEW of mission activities gives a complete and concise view of Open Arms' outreach program for June through October, 2023.

JUNE: Offering for Camp Hope totaled \$755.00. The Mission Team still plans to arrange a time to serve a meal to the residents of Camp Hope. Gail will find a contact, gather some information, and schedule a meal sometime in August.

JULY: The Christus Mobil Health Unit, sponsored by the Mission Team, gave free back-to-school vaccinations on Tuesday, July 18, at the Tamina Community Center. Backpacks filled with supplies were provided for each child that came to the health clinic. Leftover back packs and supplies will be donated to a local elementary school, Houser Elementary, for use as the staff sees a need. Back to school supplies are covered by grant funds.

Interfaith of the Woodlands and Montgomery County Food Bank are Open Arms missions this month; since both have requested support for purchasing food, our monthly mission offering will be divided between the two agencies.

AUGUST: As another back-to-school project, Pam Mayo will fill "teacher cheer" bags for about sixty teachers at Houser Elementary School. The bags will contain special teaching tools to help in the classroom and personal items for the teachers' use. Again, grant funds will help finance these bags for which \$150.00 was appropriated.

Houston Association Vacation Bible School, hosted by St. Peter UCC, has requested funds. for supplies. The Team allocated \$200.00 from OAUCC August mission money for the VBS.

SEPTEMBER: The mission focus will be on disabilities, perhaps in the use of music therapy or other areas of therapy that might need assistance. Suggestions would be welcome.

OCTOBER: Neighbors in Need, one of the UCC "five for five" categories cited as an area for denominational offering, is the October mission for OA. Notes of reminder: One Great Hour of Sharing and Strengthen the Church as part of the "five for five" need funding by the end of the year. The Houston Association dues are also important. Keeping up with mission responsibilities is a critical job for our group.

Remember our fundraising project for Forever Home, "Change for Change"? Accounting Sunday, the day we first bring in our collected change, is scheduled for September 17. If you have one full jar of coins, start on another, and

bring it all to church in September. Then start another collection jar for the next accounting period.

This group will be performing again on **September 22** at Dennis Johnson Big Stone Lodge on Riley-Fuzzell Road in a show called **It Really Happened in Old Spring**. Details of that performance will be published soon.

On October 3rd, you are invited to Fall into Health with a free health screening and flu shots performed by the Christus Mobile Health Unit at Tamina Community Center. Lunch will also be served. This service will be provided for OAUCC and the Tamina Community.

Programs to Help the Christian Grow

E SPEAK of "planting the church." It might be good to "plant the Christian"—to help the individual become more and more deeply rooted in his Christian knowledge and faith. Here are some programs at Open Arms that aid in planting and growing the Christian.

- 1. Dr. Carol McAninch and Vicky Royster provide us with a daily meditation, prayer, and Bible reading to help in turning us toward Christian behavior and thought each day.
- 2. On Sunday mornings Dr. Carol is leading a course on spiritual development. As a guide, the class is using 15 Ways of Doing Prayer by Kristen Ingram. Members are encouraged to become still so that they can hear God speaking with them and welcoming their prayers.

- **3.** Using Biblical passages as his guide in Sunday worship, Rev. Dr. Jules, offers a spirit-filled session that instructs us, strengthens us, and prepares us to be Christ-like in a secular and often confusing society.
- 4. Rev. Bill Royster, with help from his friends, plans a series of weekday Zoom sessions on issues related to gun violence in American society. The class will not be a stage for arguing, or abolishing, or deleting; it will be a time for discussing and understanding—a time for people of Christian faith to look at the whole picture of a complex situation.
- 5. The Houston Association of the UCC is planning a multi-church Vacation Bible School for the children of the HA on Thursday, August 3 to Saturday, August 5, 2023. Sunday School and Vacation Bible School are where "planting the Christian" begins. Two Open Arms families will be participating in this VBS, maybe more.

Lit Wits: Running Witless in July

A couple of us met and had a phone talk about John Grisham's popular novel, *Boys from Biloxi*, the book for the evening.
