Vision Meeting in April

he Vision group met after church on April 21 to share ideas from each of the church's committees. Two subjects were the main focus of the meeting: (1) grants, grant opportunities, and grant follow-ups; (2) budgeting for mission giving.

In terms of grants, the \$15,000 CASA grant requires follow-up with a coach who is to help guide the church in working on its Smart Goals. Our goals are to obtain a meeting place of our own with appropriate furnishings and equipment for us to function as a caring, out-reach mission church. Rev. Don Egan is our coach, challenging us to think about where we are going and to plan the ways we can work on our goals.

The issue of budgeting a monthly or annual amount for missions resulted in debate. Some felt limiting mission spending was not appropriate for our church group; others felt such action was practical for a church trying to afford a place to put down roots so it could continue to invest in mission work for a long, long time. Participants are struggling to find a compromise between the two ideas. This impasse calls for prayer from all of us.
