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The Hand That Rocks the Cradle "Saves" the World

N MAY 14, MOTHER'S DAY, we consider the woman most influential in our lives. We revere her memory if she is no longer with us and show our affection if she is still here, in both instances cherishing what she has done for us in loving, teaching, and nurturing. We rarely think of her as a "savior." Yet that role as savior may be the most important role in the function of a mother.

In the book of *Genesis*, some mothers were just that, ones who *saved* a child for the role he would play in future events. Sarah sent the child, Ishmael, into the wilderness to face a sure death so that she could save her son, Isaac, to inherit Abraham's role as the leader of God's chosen people. Ishmael's mother Hagar was no less of a savior, for she endured the desert with her child, gave him life-preserving water, and saw him become "a great nation." Moses' mother saved him from the watery grave Pharoah had ordered for Hebrew boys, saved him to lead his people out of Egypt and across the wilderness to the Promised Land.

Solomon in his idealistic depiction of a wife and mother (*Proverbs* 31:10) designs a woman with the elements of a savior: she is honorable and thrifty, but most important, she stands on the edge of her world ready to catch and *save* the "needy" and "poor," the family members whom she protects from illness, the servants who are guaranteed their "portions," the household that needs her alacrity in managing domestic affairs.

And in the Gospels, blessed Mary, also teetered on the edge of her Son's world, ready to *save* if she could--when He was whisked away to Egypt, when He was at the temple as a child, when He was an itinerant preacher, when He suffered on the cross. Ultimately, she could not save Him. He was too busy saving us.

On this Mother's Day, think of your mother as your savior. How did she *save* you? How did she contribute to who and what you are today? Christ is the Universal Savior. A mother is the "personal savior" of her child—life giving, defending, reaching out to keep you from falling.

"Biology is the least of what makes someone a mother"



News From the Houston Association UCC

THE HOUSTON ASSOCIATION of the United Church of Christ is composed of UCC churches and affiliates in the Houston area. On April 22, the HA met in its regular spring meeting, located this year at St. John's UCC in Rosenberg. Five Open Arms members represented our church as well as Pam Mayo, who is Association Secretary.

One of the main subjects brought up during the business meeting was the discussion of the future of Slumber Falls Camp in New Braunfels since a proposal is to sell the camp. Those who love the camp lament its possible loss to the denomination. Hope is that the property will be purchased by a group within the UCC for continued use as the lovely worship and recreational spot that it is. However, many conflicting factors are involved in this issue.

Cindy Sterling, HA Moderator, discussed several items on the agenda, including the works of a committee exploring various Mental Health initiatives in the Association and a committee researching Refugee Sponsorship. She also talked about a Vacation Bible School for the entire HA.

Recipients of Bethel Grants reported on what they have done and what they plan to do with revenue from the grants awarded to them.

Dr. Kendall Moore's Ecclesiastical Council highlighted the meeting. Before the entire assembly, Dr. Moore was required to present his faith journey and to discuss his call to serve. Then he had to answer, extemporaneously, questions put to him from the audience of forty+ attendees. The questions ranged from a simple request for him to discuss his seminary, Eden, to more complex queries about how he would serve as the pastor of a church during certain situations. Kendall's performance was stellar, and he received a standing ovation. His status, prior to ordination, was affirmed. Following the questioning, Kendall gave the sermon for the morning's worship service. (Kendall, Open Arms loves you and is proud of you.)

The meeting concluded with the noon meal and an open discussion of church issues.




