Report From Church

Property Search Committee

THE OPEN ARMS PROPERTY SEARCH COMMITTEE HAS MET TWICE—August 7 and August 24. Important discussions, decisions and, conclusions have come from these meetings. Please note the following areas covered by the Search Committee:

- 1. Considering the widespread homes of the congregants, the best location for us may be found in the area between Robinson Road and 336 Loop South. A plot of two to three acres would be the appropriate size. If a structure is on the plot we purchase, it might be remodeled into a church, or a bare piece of land could be the place to build.
- 2. It was agreed that we need the help of a real estate agent who knows the area and our needs as a young church. Peter Royster will take the lead in this aspect.
- 3. The Committee has identified property on F/M 1488, Robinson Road, Hannah Road, and Tamina Road. We ask your help in finding property which would be suitable for us. Everyone is asked to participate!
- 4. An ongoing problem is the amount of money our budget could handle. We will likely need at least a 20% down payment on property.

- 5. Fund-raising is critical. Options include a "Go Fund Me" outreach. Also, we need to support church fund-raising projects: "Stitched with Love" sales, "Change for Change," the theatrical program that members are working on for September 22, a garage sale scheduled for October 14 at Kenneth and David's, and a fall bake sale (TBA). (And a "walk" by our pastor and his wife.)
- 6. Members of the Committee are contacting persons that might help with fund raising activities. They are also looking for grant opportunities and contacting UCC sources. We will be asking for assistance for research in completing grants.
- 7. Rev. Carol will be leading a prayer group to regularly pray to support the church's efforts to secure a permanent home. See Rev. Carol to participate.
- 8. Peter and Vicky are working on publicity activities to make the church more visible to the public.
