I want to share the words my sons penned on their Facebook page after we all experienced the unthinkable at church. We never know how much we influence someone, but it's good to know that I have made a mark in the lives of my three young adult children. May we all inspire someone along life's journey.

Why Do We Lift?

n the morning of Sept 5, 2021, at 9:20 am, I heard my mother screaming from outside the venue as we were setting up for church. Our dad collapsed on a bench, and his eyes were wide and rolled back into his head, and he was foaming at the mouth. Mustapha got to him to prevent him from falling onto the concrete, and Nia called 911 as I held him in my lap. He was struggling to breathe and fighting for air. He was dying. EMTs arrived in a few minutes, and they initially couldn't get him on the stretcher due to his mass. But Mustapha and I were able to help get him on the stretcher. It's incredibly surreal to lift your father onto a stretcher as he's close to death right in front of you, especially with your mother crying beside you. I remembered years and years ago how my father carried my grandfather Jules Williams Sr. onto a stretcher after he died.

Once our dad got to the hospital and went into surgery for blood clots in his lungs, he went into ICU to begin the recovery process. The doctors told him he was fortunate to survive the ordeal. They said anyone else would've died during the initial collapse and loss of breath. Because of his cardiovascular endurance and years of strength training, he was able to hold on long enough until he got to the hospital. The average person wouldn't have been able to fight for breath as long as he did. He fought what should've been a 1-2 minutes death for close to 15 minutes. It was like one extensive high rep set of lifting. He is truly the strongest man we've ever known.

His lifestyle saved his life in the end. He brought us into this lifestyle long ago. Our strength enabled us to get his 312lb frame onto the stretcher. We lifted his upper and lower back from the heaviest parts while the paramedics reached the rest. If we wouldn't have been strong enough, I don't know how long it would've taken the paramedics to get him onto the stretcher by themselves. His lifestyle ultimately saved his life. He is the

reason why we all lift weights and help others live healthier lives. He is our motivation to train even when we are tired after a long day of helping other people reach their health goals. Since Day 1, his motto has always been "Lift For Life." In the end, he truly did lift for life.

SEPTEMBER MISSION FOR OPEN ARMS: HELP FOR THOSE IN NEED

he September mission for Open Arms is help for the island of Haiti. The congregation gathers goods the last Sunday of each month and transports the groceries on Sunday afternoon to a local community center food pantry that collects and distributes food for needy citizens. Open Arms also prepares dinners once a month for disabled, senior citizens, or others in need.
