n the South Central Conference Newsletter, December 2, 2021, the Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ formally welcomed Open Arms UCC in Spring, Texas, as a certified Open and Affirming Congregation (#1732). The Coalition added Open Arms to the catalog of ONA churches in the UCC and asked all to join in prayerful blessing of this union along with a call for "new passion and energy for living the Gospel!"

On January 2, 2022, the Open Arms congregation formally voted on adding to its constitution a personal Membership Covenant affirming ONA membership. The Covenant reads in part: We will walk together, "holding hands in community and fellowship with persons of all sexual orientations or gender identities, knowing we are all children of the same family and the same God."

The class will be face to face in a private room during the noon hour twice a month in a local restaurant where we feed both our bodies and souls.
